Five ways to celebrate WRAD with Google's Read Along

- Start the day with a read aloud from the Read Along collection With 1,000+ books in over 11 languages, you'll have no trouble finding the right books for your students. As students read, they can click on a word they need help with to get personalized support from their reading buddy.
- 2 Celebrate home languages WRAD is celebrated in over 170 countries annually. Use Read Along to find books in your students' home languages and invite them to read these aloud.
- Use the insights feature to analyze student progress and create shared goals For those of you who have access to Read Along in Google Classroom*, invite students to cocreate their reading futures by setting goals together on WRAD. Use Read Along insights to identify knowledge gaps for individual students and the whole class, then create shared goals. Read Along allows you to easily find books that both meet your students where they are and challenge them to build their skills.
- 4 Have a WRAD Read Along celebration at the end of the day Learning is more powerful when it's shared. Get together with another class and celebrate WRAD together. And don't forget food! Invite children to cocreate your celebration. Visit <u>litworld.org</u> to download stickers to show that you read aloud today together.
- Share a Read Along moment at home with loved ones The research is clear: reading aloud facilitates family bonding. Share Read Along with your families and urge them to set aside time to use Read Along together. Whether the read aloud happens on the train or as part of a bedtime routine, any time is a great time to read aloud.



Educators can access a unique Read Along experience within Google Classroom² that has added features like automatic insights for educators and a ready-to-go library of books.




